NSAI, in exercise of the power conferred by section 16 (3) of the National Standards Authority of Ireland Act, 1996 (No. 28 of 1996) and with the consent of the Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, hereby declares as follows:

1. This instrument may be cited as the Standard Specification (Cash-in-transit services) Declaration, 2006.
2. (1) The Specification set forth in the Schedule to this declaration is hereby declared to be the standard specification for Cash-in-transit services.

(2) The said standard specification may be cited as Irish Standard 998: 2006 or as I.S. 998: 2006.

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Foreword

The National Standards Authority of Ireland formulates standards at the request of the Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment. Proposed standards are circulated for comment to organizations and persons likely to be interested and are reviewed in the light of comments received. Standards when completed by NSAI are declared to be Standard Specifications with the consent of the Minister.

False representation that a commodity, process or practice conforms to a standard is an offence under the National Standards Authority of Ireland Act, 1996.

This Standard was originally prepared following representation from the Private Security Authority (PSA) to provide a specification underwriting best practice for the provision of Cash-In-Transit services that will be used following prior approval by the Garda Technical Advisory Group as a basis for licensing under the Private Security Services Act, 2004. The initial draft was prepared by NSAI's Ad-Hoc Committee on Cash-In-Transit Services, which included representatives of the industry, banks, trades unions, trainers, An Garda Síochána, PSA, and NSAI. The final text was the result of the circulation of the initial text for public comment. This Standard forms part of an integrated approach to best practice in Cash-In-Transit services, taken in conjunction with the Irish Bankers' Federation Voluntary Code of Practice drawn up by representative stakeholders in the national environment.

Users of the Standard are advised to consider the desirability of third-party certification of a conformity based on continuing surveillance, which may be coupled with the assessment of a supplier's quality system in accordance with I.S. EN ISO 9000.

Compliance with a Standard does not in itself confer immunity from legal obligations.

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
